

From the Helm . . .



Another season is here. Most of our captains are doing well around the state. Talking with many captains from Lakes Huron, Erie and Michigan fishing is very good to red-hot. The walleye bite is limit catches on Lake Erie, Saginaw Bay and salmon catches for Central and Southern Lake Michigan on most days is very good to excellent.... Seems if the fishing is slow on a certain day the weather has played a factor in the catch, from reports from captains. Salmon are being reported caught by captains as far north as Leland. On Lake Huron, Atlantic Salmon are showing up in the catch by our captains up and down the Lake Huron shoreline. Some of those fish are starting to show some size. Let us hope this fishery continues to expand. These are a terrific gamefish for our customers.

MCBA has closely followed the commercial fishing statue being updated by our state legislature, MUCC and other sport fishing groups. Our point man from MCBA, Past President Captain Terry Walsh has been involved with the updated changes to the revised statue from day one and kept me informed on progress of implementing this new statue. Myself, VP Captain Bill Winowiecki and past President Captain Terry Walsh were to attend a legislative hearing at the Capital Building in Lansing. We were to voice our opinions on the updated

changes to the proposed new statue. Of particular importance to our membership is the bi-catch of walleye on Lake Huron and Lake Trout in Northern Lake Michigan.

Unfortunately, at the last minute this meeting was canceled for reasons not given to us and other sport fishing groups.


On June 11, 2018, an oversight committee meeting in Alpena, MI was held over the issue of cormorant control, or I should say lack of control, by the US Fish and Wildlife Service. For our members to see more on this oversight meeting you can go to YouTube to view.

The 2018 charter season has started. Good catches of lake trout and some very large salmon are being reported.

We are three years into the brown trout plant on the northwest coast of Lake Michigan. It seems to be working. I'm hearing rumors, and looking at many pictures of nice brown trout caught from Le-land to Ludington. Late April through May seems to be the best time to catch these fish.

King Salmon Plants: The Tribes did not agree with a MDNR proposal to reduce lake trout plants in northwestern Lake Michigan. There will be an increase from 330,000 to 450,000 king salmon in 2019 due to lake trout cuts in southern Lake Michigan to stay within the guidelines of the predator prey balance sheet.

Tribal Law Enforcement: All the letters, phone calls and attending meetings helped us replace, and add officers to the State Tribal Enforcement Unit. Officers appointed are:

Northwest Lower Michigan: Officer Sean Kehoe

Central Upper Peninsula: Officer Mike Hammill

Eastern Upper Peninsula: Officer Kevin Postma

Southern Lake Huron: Officer Nick Atkin

Investigator Upper Peninsula: Officer John Busken

Investigator Lower Peninsula: Officer Nick Torskey

We want to welcome to these officers. As we all know with the new Tribal Decree approaching, we will need all the help we can get.

The new Michigan DNR online licensing website is a bit of a disaster. I do know they are working on it as of the writing of this article. It is way too

complicated, and takes way too much time to write a 24 hour license. The MCBA board has voiced our disappointment on this issue.

We had Coast Guard Officer CDR Matt Dooris at our last MCBA Board meeting. He was very informal. The Coast Guard is going to clamp down on illegal charters around the state.

The board stressed that if a charter boat has a State of Michigan inspection sticker and an MCBA sticker dated for 2018, please give us a pass, and go to the next boat. He was very appreciative of this information. He was given MCBA stickers to educate Coast Guard officers around the state.


Tribal Decree: The tribes are dragging their feet on coming to the table to start negotiations of the new Tribal Decree. The old decree expires August 27, 2020. The State is prepared and ready to get started.

There are some issues on Northern Lake Huron Zone MH-1. The sport fishery went over their total allowable catch (TAC) two years in a row. The sport anglers are looking at a reduction from a three lake trout limit to a two fish limit.


The MCBA Raffle to support the "Coalition to Protect Michigan Resources" will be mailed out shortly. Larry has all the tickets and envelopes printed. Sue will be stuffing envelopes shortly. Lake Erie & Lake St. Clair

Hello everyone,



Earlier this Spring I had attended the Great Lakes Invasive Carp Challenge (Carp Tank and Summit) which was held at the Port Authority in Detroit.

The DNR and the governor's office along with Pure Michigan Business Connect were excited to host an innovation competition to identify a solution to the invasive carp issue that's threatening the Great Lakes.

The top four finalists gave their presentations to the judges which included Gov. Rick Snyder, Dr. Denise Shaw, Jeff DeBoer, and Prof. David Lodge.

The winning solution was presented to Edem Tsikata from Boston, MA with his idea of a cavitation barrier to deter the Asian Carp. His prize was a check for \$200,000. All four finalists and six runners-up received nice checks for their ideas.

Kinder Morgan Utopia Ltd. is planning to replace approx. 835-meter sections of its existing pipeline under the Detroit River between Windsor, Ontario Canada and Wayne County, MI. Kinder Morgan is proposing to undertake a routine maintenance project to improve the 10-inch crossing by replacing it with a new 10-inch crossing that will be buried deeper under the Detroit River via the horizontal directional drilling method.

Per the Great Lakes Wind Truth, Lake Erie Captains be aware that a U.S. Wind developer, Larry Wagner, is now partnered with Fred Olsen Renewables to industrialize and forever ruin Lake Erie.

They plan to start with an "icebreaker project" of six turbines, 6-8 miles off shore of Cleveland. Their ultimate goal, they say, is to install up to or more than 1400! Imagine the impacts on fisheries, small aircraft, sea planes, and recreational activities. There will be a public hearing, Icebreaker Wind, on July 19, 2018 at 6 PM at the Cleveland City Council Chambers - Cleveland City Hall, 2nd floor - room 216, 601 Lakeside Ave., Cleveland, OH 44114

They would like confirmation if you plan on attending.

Northern Lake Michigan

The 2018 fishing season is well underway and most if not all boats have been inspected by the DNR. During the inspections this Spring the DNR reminded all Captains to ensure they are filling out their daily catch reports, keeping a copy on board (electronic or paper) and not to be late when sending in the monthly reports. The early reports of fishing are good. There are reports of good Salmon fishing in southern Lake Michigan and those fish seem to be heading north as the water warms up. In northern Lake Michigan, the stocking effort of brown trout appears to be providing some nice catches. We hope that the DNR continues to make this fishery available to anglers. Lake trout fishing, which is the main stay of the northern Lake Michigan fishery, so far, seems to be good. Captains seem to be getting decent catches of fish in the shallower waters. These lake trout are foraging mostly on the round gobies. In 2017, lake trout harvest by sport anglers MM-1, 2, 3 was below the limit. In MM-4, the lake trout harvest exceeded the limit by 6,322 pounds and MM-5 the lake trout harvest exceeded the limit by 449 pounds. This excess harvest is minimal and will not trigger a penalty and not affect the 2018 harvest limits. Best of luck to all of you on the 2018 season. I hope to see many of you at the Annual Meeting in Traverse City this October.

Ludington State Park in the Sable River. None of these fish were net penned this year. Next year there are plans to net pen half the plant to see if net penning Coho's increases their return rate to the river.

SEA K'S LICENSING LORE

As Mother Nature continues to surprise me with a different weather condition every few hours, I have to wonder if she should not be in the MCBA random drug-testing program. As we move into June, depression has started to set in because I haven't had a line in the water yet. Sure, hope it does not adversely affect my ability to properly review your paperwork. I was planning on a relatively quiet licensing summer when a Coast Guard notice appeared on the computer. The notice is entitled "New CG-719 Series of Forms Implementation". The English translation, they just issued all new application, physical, drug testing and small boat sea service forms which must be utilized for any application package dated after September 1, 2018. I have only had an opportunity to conduct a

cursory review, but if you thought the old physical form was a challenge, wait until you see the new 10 -page replacement. The other forms appear relatively similar with a few formatting changes, but the physical is a site to behold. I hope to have more detailed information for you at the conference in Traverse City. Hope you all have a great season.

The 2018 Great Lakes fishing season is under-way and we have been receiving reports of great salmon catches for parts of Lake Michigan and excellent walleye fishing in Saginaw Bay and Lake Erie.

2017 Charter Results: Port tables where charter fishing activity occurred are complete; the tables are available on the DNR Charter Fishing web page. Feel free to contact me if you need assistance finding this information on the web or would like me to email you particular port data.

Monthly Reporting: The form packets for 2018 monthly charter fishing reporting were sent out April 4th; if you did not receive your packet please contact me and I will send you a new packet. Operators who report online DO NOT receive a reporting packet in the mail. Online reporters can access their account at any time; please remember to use the non-fishing month feature to check off months of 2018 when you were not actively fishing.

New Online Reporting System: Delayed. Fisheries Division's goal was to have the new reporting system available in summer 2018. The development process has been delayed and I do not anticipate the new system to be operational prior to fall 2018. The current online system will continue to be in use until the new reporting system is completed. If you are using paper forms but would like to change from mail to reporting online, please contact me to set up your online reporting account. An operator cannot use both methods to report. One option must be selected. I am available to help you

understand and use the online reporting system. Give me a call or send me an email and I can lead you through the reporting features. Consider signing up today. Currently 50% of charter operators in Michigan are using the online monthly reporting system.

Enbridge: 'Feasible' to replace Line Five in tunnel under Straits

TRAVERSE CITY — Enbridge Inc. said in a report out Friday, June 22nd that it would be feasible but costly to replace its controversial Line 5 pipeline with a tunneled version and "virtually" eliminate any risk of an oil spill in the Straits of Mackinac. A 30-inch pipeline could be housed in a roughly four-mile tunnel lined with concrete and buried 100 feet below the lake bed, the Canadian energy company told the state of Michigan in a required report. The projected cost would be \$350 million to \$500 million over six years of planning and construction.

Snyder said the report will help the state "define a comprehensive solution for all utility crossings." "Line 5 cannot remain in the Straits indefinitely," the governor said in a statement. "We need a concrete strategy and time line to expedite its replacement."

The aging dual pipelines, built in 1953, transport up to 540,000 barrels a day of light crude oil and

Great Lakes Policy on Great Lakes Gas and Oil Drilling

WASHINGTON, D.C. — An executive order signed by President Donald Trump on Tuesday reversed an Obama-era policy that ordered for the protection of oceans and the Great Lakes.

U.S. Senator Debbie Stabenow (D-Michigan) sent a letter to the President on Wednesday to remind him that there is a permanent federal ban on gas and oil drilling in the Great Lakes.

"The economic and environmental significance of the Great Lakes cannot be overstated," Stabenow wrote. "Our Great Lakes are the largest surface freshwater system on Earth, supply drinking water to over 40 million people, and sustain a \$6 trillion economy and over 50 million jobs. Given the existing ban on drilling and the importance of the Great Lakes, I call on you to reverse course and oppose any efforts to open our waters to oil and gas drilling as a result of your recent Executive Order." 🐟

State Record Black Buffalo

OTTAWA COUNTY — The Michigan Department of Natural Resources confirmed the catch of a new state record black buffalo on June 12, 2018.

The fish, a member of the sucker family, was caught by Brandonn Kramer of Muskegon at 11:30 p.m. May 25, 2018 on the Grand River in Ottawa County. Assistance was provided by Kramer's friend and fishing cohort, Shawn Grawbarger, also of Muskegon. The fish weighed 46.54 pounds and measured 39.75 inches. Kramer was bowfishing when he landed the record fish.


The record was verified by Jay Wesley, a DNR fisheries manager for Lake Michigan. 🐟
