From Frankfort south to other ports along the coastline, King fishing was very good and these fish ran huge in size again this season. At my home port of Frankfort just about every active charter operation had a least one 30 lb. or more brought over the side of their boat. Some had several this big caught on their boats. Ports south of mine, Manistee, Ludington, Grand Haven and others south had outstanding catches of huge king salmon. Ludington reports from Capt. Chucks tackle shop...over 70 King Salmon were weighed in 30 lbs. and above.

So with all these huge salmon around and I myself seeing huge pods of bait fish on my charters daily as well as other captains talking about the huge bait numbers to me this season, many of our members and myself included feel the time is right to increase king salmon plants again. This

I had baitfish in 35 ft. of water and out in 500 ft. of water, bait pods so large my graph would lose bottom to heavy concentrations of baitfish. Let us hope we can move ahead with more kings in the next several years.

Something that has come to my attention and would like to pass this along to our members. Several weeks ago, the Coast Guard ticketed a local charter operation out of my port for children not wearing life jackets. They apparently were under age. Federal law states that children under the age of 13 must wear life jackets. Exceptions to this law is if the under age children are below deck or in an enclosed cabin and if the boat is not underway... so this law has some gray areas but best advice is have under age children wearing life jackets. I ask the parents if the children are under age to bring some that fit their children.

In closing this Cannonball President's report I hope to see everyone at our fall banquet and Saturday fisheries workshop meetings at the Great Wolf Lodge in Traverse City this coming October. need to be taken to achieve a 40 percent phosphorus reduction goal. It includes continuing to tighten sewage treatment facility permits, targeting Michigan's portion of the Maumee River and River Raisin watersheds for phosphorus reduction.

The causes of algae blooms are complex, and Michigan's Domestic Action Plan underscores the need to take a look at the big picture to improve water quality in the lake. The plan will show the measurable steps being taken on several fronts including the implementation of agriculture best practices, improvements to wastewater treatment, improve street/storm water run off controls, and the restoration of wetlands.

Algae are simple, non-flowering plants that are a natural part of freshwater and ocean ecosystems. Not all algae cause harm, but overgrowth can indicate a disruption in the ecosystem. Too much phosphorus, a nutrient that accelerates algae growth, has been identified as one cause of intense algal blooms in the western part of Lake Erie. As the warmest and shallowest Great Lake, Lake Erie, especially its western basin, is vulnerable to algal blooms, which can threaten ecological health and drinking water quality.

The final Lake Erie Domestic Action Plan will be integrated into a larger comprehensive plan, that combines plans from nearby Great Lakes states, the province of Ontario, and the U.S. and Canadian governments.

On another note, as the boating season comes to a close, my patience with inexperienced drivers is wearing thin. With the high waters this year, so

many boaters think the "no wake" doesn't pertain to them. And do all pleasure crafts try to come as close as they can, wide open, to a boat that's fishing?

### Endangered Species Act.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is considering whether lake sturgeon should be listed as threatened or endangered under the Endangered Species Act.

This comes after a petition from the Center for Biological Diversity.

Georgia Parham is with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. She says the Center provided enough information about the status of sturgeon to warrant an in-depth review.

This doesn't mean we're listing the lake sturgeon now or possibly not in the future. It just means we're going to take a pretty close look at its status to determine whether we should propose it for listing at some point, Parham said.

She says the Center for Biological Diversity cited threats to the species including hydroelectric facilities and contamination.

Parham says the agency will consult with tribes

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and conservation groups during its in-depth review.

That will help inform whether or not we propose this species for listing at some point down the road, she said.

Parham says the Service will look at factors including the sturgeon's current and historic population.

She says sturgeon have been a focus of the agency even before this process.  $\searrow$ 



#### Northern Lake Michigan By Captain Tony Radjenovich - MCBA Director

The 2019 fishing season is starting to wind down and as I reflect of the experiences and adventures I and my clients enjoyed this season I'm very

thankful for the fishery we have in northern Lake Michigan. For us captains up north and for that matter throughout the lake we are thankful for lake trout. We typically refer to Lake Trout as our "bread and butter" fish. When we consider the lake trout fishery in northern Lake Michigan, we must also recognize that the five management units north of Arcadia are in tribal ceded waters and subject to the harvest limits set forth in the 2000 Consent Decree. Management units 1,2,3 & 4 all have a stipulated or agreed upon Total Allowable Catch, TAC, and management unit 5, has a TAC set by biology or modeling of fish abundance. As our captains who fish Grand Traverse Bay or Management unit 4 have had to adjust their operations to comply with a daily bag limit of one fish per angler during this 2019 season, us captains in the other management units should take the necessary steps to ensure we continue to have a viable lake trout fishery. What this means is that now a diverse fishery is needed more than ever. We need abundant numbers of all species: kings, Coho, steelhead and brown trout in addition to the lake trout. As I have interviewed some of our captains in preparation for this article, I find that most fisherman are optimists and will find the positive in the current situation. With that said, I have heard on numerous occasions that if it wasn't for lake trout their business would be struggling.

The Lake Michigan Committee is considering increasing stocking of king salmon in the spring of 2020. For several years the committee has reduced the stocking of king salmon and I believe we have all noticed the results. As many captains have told me that the king salmon fishery was slower than in years past, a hit or miss fishery or the worst in years. There are very few reports of browns being caught and the steelhead report seems to be down from previous years. The Coho run is just starting and so I don't have a good report currently. Therefore, I ask you all to please contact our lake managers and let them know what you want and need for the fishery in northern Lake Michigan. I have reached out to our Lake Michigan Basin Coordinator and suggested that increased plants of fish in streams and rivers in northern Lake Michigan would allow captains from all ports to have a chance at these fish as they travel on their winter and summer migrations.

The MCBA 2019 Annual Conference will have our lake managers in attendance and this would be a good time to discuss your needs of a diverse fishery with them. I hope to see many of you at the conference. As always, please contact me with your questions or comments.



#### Central Lake Michigan

This has been the year of the big king. Captain Chuck's II in Ludington has weighed in more than 70 kings 30 lbs. and over and a 40 pounder

was caught in Muskegon. It is exciting to think that it is possible to catch the fish of a lifetime on a charter, but the king numbers are still down - pounds don't equal numbers. Captains are seeing lots of bait on their graphs and in the stomachs of their catch. The signs in Central Lake Michigan seem to support planting more kings. The June and July offshore fishery in Central Lake Michigan did not happen again this year. Fair numbers of kings showed up in June, but good king numbers didn't happen in July and August.

The Ludington Offshore Classic held in mid-July has been primarily a lake trout tournament the last few years. The lake trout fishing has been excellent but many clients fishing in July and August still ask when the best time is to catch kings.

Michigan's Upper Peninsula by Captain Dick Stafford MCBA Past President

Looks as if the season is winding down on a questionable note. Most charters in the area are sit-

ting idle now compared to other years. Sparse walleye populations in the upper region of Little Bay de Noc along with minimal salmon again have contributed to this slow up. While many areas in Michigan are having a fantastic year for salmon, this area's salmon and walleye population has greatly declined.

What we do have is fantastic bass and northern pike fishing. In addition, right now the perch fishing is great with many perch being caught in the 8-10" class. Therefore, we stress the positive and learn from the negative. Good charter fishermen adapt.

This is a good time of the year with a little time on the hands to look at what went well with your business this year. Look at what can be improved and maybe what can be omitted. Marketing is the key to any successful business. Gather your database names of clients and keep them all on your "returning clients list". A little extra personal touch can be rewarding.

Several captains in MCBA will gladly give ideas on how to improve marketing and how to go after that market. Maxine Appleby is fantastic in this area along with others. Also. The fall membership meeting is almost here. Very few from the U.P. go to these but they serve as important verbal communication between Michigan State Sea Grant, Michigan DNR, MCBA and the Coastguard. There are also marketing expert present to help wherever they can. Overall, it is a great weekend.

It is easy to find fault, but work to make it better by offering viable solutions to help solve the problem.

# From Paradise to Reality

This fishing season has opened eyes and given a stark reality of what may be coming to the Upper Peninsula. In this beautiful place to live, (the U.P.,) we have 4300 inland lakes, 12,000 miles of streams, and 1700 miles of shoreline on three of the Great Lakes. Approximately 320,000 people live up here, which is about 3% of Michigan's total population. The Upper Peninsula is 384 miles from Drummond Island to Ironwood wide and 233 miles tall

from Menominee to Cooper Harbor. The Lower Peninsula is 277 miles north to south and 195 miles at the widest. Where is this going you might ask? The U.P. had only about 4% of the total fish planted by the State of Michigan DNR. One time it was explained to me by the DNR that fish could not be planted if the forage base could not support it. For years as I would leave on a charter trip, I would look back and see a great deal of cut alewives (shad) in my prop wash. I would say that was an abundance so more predator fish (salmon, splake, browns,) could be planted.

Walleye were netted from Little Bay de Noc and eggs and spawn were taken to be hatched and used throughout the state. This is a very fragile fishery. I recently spoke with a DNR Biologist who told me that the walleye were coming back slowly but would never be at the numbers in the 80"s.

Sport fishing is a very important part to the economy of the U.P. whether it is on Lake Superior, Lake Michigan, or Lake Huron. The Upper Peninsula needs to have a better stocking program rather than whatever is left over. Little Bay de Noc was once known as the Walleye Capital of the World or so the locals referred to it. If someone needed fish for supper, they would row out, fish for an hour and come back home with plenty for supper. Freezers were not need to hold for later.

Great charters are sitting idle where once they were running multiple daily trips. Some charter are getting out of the business and selling boats.

Michigan needs to protect its charter industry but instead it is making it very difficult to stay in business.

One good solution to our problem would be to increase the number of planted fish in the U.P. waters of the Great Lakes. That would include salmon, lake trout, splake, walleye and brown trout. Help make this a strong fishery as it once was. Solution: Keep the successful programs going strong and if money is left over, then start pilot programs. Give us back our healthy economy.



has produced more large Chinooks; many over 30 pounds, than we have seen in two decades or more. We aren't seeing the large number of fish being caught that we were several years ago, but mixed in with these large kings is a pretty good and steady catch of lake trout, and a fair number of steelhead. Recently there have been some very large Coho's in the catch as well. It seems like fishing is decent to good. In addition, for sure, the big kings are exciting both the customers and the private anglers. I have not seen this many boats at the Ludington Loomis Street launch site in many, many years. The The MCBA is closely monitoring the three Commercial Fishing bills in Lansing. SB4567, SB4568, and SB4569 are advancing through our State Leg-

islature. These bills are designed to regulate and update the Commercial Fishing Regulations. Everything from reporting, net marking, and which fish can be commercially harvested. Our state licensed commercial fishers want lake trout, walleye and perch. These fish are designated as sport fish, these fish should be off limits to commercial harvest in our Great Lakes.

As we wrap up the fishing season the MCBA fall conference is coming up fast. Please consider attending. We have a great agenda this year. The fall conference is



going to be important to all charter captains, and mates. We will have updates on the Tribal Decree, Lake Michigan, Lake Huron, Lake St. Clair, and Lake Erie basin coordinators in a break out session. Coast Guard personnel and Michigan DNR Director Dan Eichinger as a guest speaker at the banquet dinner.

tious. If the increase is too large, perhaps we could overdo it again, which could lead to another downturn in bait, which in turn, could lead to smaller fish again, and even possibly, a reverse in the increasingly strong fishery. It seems clear that it is difficult to find the 'just right' balance.

I have heard reports of some good catches in Lake Huron too. Maybe we have turned a corner there also. Especially interesting to me are the reports of catches of Atlantics up and down the coast of Lake Huron. Atlantics are getting some serious attention! Walleyes were great this year too, and early reports suggest good perch fishing in Lake Erie, too. Let us all hope that we can continue toward having a quality mixed bag fishery long into the future.

In spite of some optimism about the uptick in fishing around the lakes, other issues remain. First: the up-coming consent decree negotiations, which are crucial to our future. Do your part; help fund our legal team, buy and/or sell some raffle tickets. Follow the negotiations as closely as possible and encourage our leaders, our lawyers and DNR personnel as they deal with this most difficult issue. We may have to live with the consequences for up to 20 years into the future. Other problems too, such as the exploding cormorant population remain. In addition, some are just out there as potential catastrophes, especially line 5 under the straits of Mackinac. Enbridge, the owners of line 5 had three major pipeline failures in the last year alone, killing one and injuring two. The environmental damage was huge. However, not nearly so much as such failure of line 5 would cause in the great lakes. We must not let our quard down. We need to focus strongly on these issues or face severe consequences in the future.

Is your vessel documented? Recently I was asked if the USCG requires documentation for passenger for hire boats – AKA: UPV's. The answer: Yes, if your boat is more than five gross tons (approximately 25 feet), your charter boat must be documented. https://homeport.uscg.mil/Lists/ Content/Attachments/1600/UPV\_JobAid2011.pdf

This is often overlooked at inspection time, but should there be an incident involving the USCG, no documentation could become a serious issue. There is some paperwork, some marking requirements and a small annual cost, (about the same as a couple of flashers): a small price to pay to know the USCG registers your vessel and to know you comply with the law. Your boats name on the bow and the stern, sans MC numbers, tells your customers (and others) that you are conscientious about following the rules

#### and regulations.

If you are planning to become a retiree soon, and if you want keep up with the constantly changing status of fishing in Michigan, I encourage you to continue your MCBA membership in the retired captain category. It is easy to do. Go to the MCBA website member section and choose the printed membership form. As of this writing, it is not possible to join as a retired member using the on-line membership application. You must printout and send in the printed application. (On the other hand, use the copy you may have received in the mail) I hope that the online web version will be fixed sometime soon, but for now, use the printout version.

Being a retired member will keep you 'in the loop'. I always look forward to seeing many of my charter boat friends, active and/or retired, at the annual MCBA fall meetings, too. We will meet at the Great Wolf Lodge near Traverse City again this fall over the weekend of October 18, 19 and 20. 3575 US Hwy 31 S, Traverse City MI 49684. The MCBA has reserved a block of rooms, at a special rate for those who wish to spend a night or two. Call -231-941-3600 and ask for the MCBA special rate. I've been involved for over 40 years now and have to report this current group are some of the most incompetent people I've ever encountered. My frustration is you, the mariner, always ends up paying the price. In my last report the Coast Guard had issued notices extending the expiration dates on certain credentials. The most recent was dated July 1st and extended most credentials until the end of August. I haven't seen any new notices, so my guess is there probably won't be any more. They did have a notice on their web site however indicating they are still backlogged and are as much as 100 calendar days behind in processing license applications. #### LAKE HURON CITIZENS FISHERY ADVISORY COMMITTEE

With Saginaw Bay walleye recruit-


ment remaining strong for the past several years and record numbers of walleye currently in the bay, the Lake Huron Citizen's

Fishery Advisory Committee (LHCFAC) recommended the opening of the Saginaw River to year around angling. This is on an experimental basis and will be closely monitored. The decision to open the river to spring fishing was made at the August 8 committee meeting with DNR fisheries personnel in Clare, Michigan.

The committee's objective is to create more recreational fishing opportunities for non-boating anglers, which right now are only available to ice fishermen during years when there is safe ice for any period of time. This is a great opportunity to recruit more fishermen; especially kids who won't need boats and snowmobiles to have ready access to the fishery. A bicycle will do just fine, which is the way a lot of the Baby Boomers got introduced to the sport. The committee would like to see the river open to walleye fishing in the spring of 2020 if at all possible. It is now up to the DNR to decide how to best implement the LHFCFAC's unanimous recommendation.

#### ATLANTIC SALMON STOCKING SITE(s) BEING EVALUATED FOR 2020

The DNR is seeking input from the LHCFAC on where to stock an anticipated surplus of Atlantic salmon next year. Though no formal recommendation has yet been made, it is likely one may come at the October meeting with the DNR. Currently, At-



lantics are stocked in the St. Mary's River in the Upper Peninsula, the Thunder Bay River in Alpena, the Au Sable River in Oscoda, and the harbor at Lexington. Lexington is the only harbor-stocking site, and interestingly, has proven the most successful for angler success. In view of this, it is felt Rogers City could have similar if not better success.

Lexington's success comes from its lack of significant predators (namely walleye) and ready access to deep water once the Atlantics are released. The same can be said for Rogers City, which also has an excellent harbor and immediate access to off shore reefs and deep water once the fish are released. An insignificant lack of predators (walleye) should increase survival rates there as well.

Currently, anglers at Rogers City catch more Atlantics than any other Lake Huron Port except De-Tour, further supporting the potential for increased angler success were they to be stocked there. The aquatic environment at Rogers City seems to be one that is highly attractive to Atlantic salmon.

Interestingly, Rogers City has submitted an impressive written proposal requesting the Atlantic salmon plant. Complete with charts and graphs of their current Atlantic salmon angler success, the proposal also boasts strong support from the community and recreational and sport fishing organizations.

Other sites identified by the DNR as having good stocking suitability are the Carp River, East Branch of the AuGres River, The AuGres River, Rifle River, and Port Austin.

# Charter Fishermen Save Sinking Boaters Near Pentwater

Two boaters got first hand knowledge of the danger of deep, cold water as they were rescued from their sinking boat near Pentwater.

The two boaters were saved from the frigid, rough water by a passing charter boat Sunday morning at the mouth of the Pentwater River, possibly their only chance of survival in the conditions.

"It was pretty much timing is all," says Trevor Castonia, captain with Sportsmen Charters, "It was right spot at the right time."

Castonia and his first mate Cy Sult first thought it was just a jet ski, blocking the mouth of the Pentwater River.

"We were making a circle waiting for them to get in and then we seen the people waving" says Castonia, "And noticed the boat was starting to sink."

They then saw it was a small bass boat amongst the large waves.

"Not very much northwest wind can create some big waves in a hurry," says Deputy Tim Simon with the Ocean County Marine Patrol, "I guess at the time of this incident they were four to five feet."

The boat wasn't big enough for the waves that were out there," says Castonia, "Their motor died and they were trying to get in on the trolling motor and the waves got them from the back."

Castonia backed his charter to the failing boat, cutting the waves and allowing Suld to throw them a life ring.

"They were cold and the wife was really scared and really cold." says Sult, "They had been in the water about five minutes."

It is still early in the season, there were very few boats out on the big lake. If the Sportsmen had not come by right at that moment, there's a good chance those two boaters don't make it, given the wind the current and the frigid water temperatures.

"Even though it might be sunny and 75 out, those water temps could still be 50 degrees," says Simon.

The boaters escaped with no injuries. Lucky to be alive with just a flooded boat to deal with.

"If we hadn't of been there at that time they wouldn't have made it," says Castonia, "We reacted quickly to what was going on when we had seen how it was."
