When I started with Michigan DNR as a Fisheries Biologist in Plainwell, my work was primarily inland. Lake and stream surveys, data analysis and report writing were on the menu daily. My work with Great Lakes Fisheries was limited to investigating BKD in Chinook Salmon and managing the fish ladders on the St. Joseph River and annually assessing the strengths of Chinook Salmon, Coho Salmon, and Steelhead Runs. It was through this work on the St. Joe that I got my first introductions to Charter Captains that plied both the river waters and the port of St. Joe. It wasn't until 2002 when I was Lake Michigan appointed the Basin Coordinator that I really got anointed in Great Lakes management and began a 20+ year stretch of working directly with the Michigan Charter Boat Association and getting to know many of the members.

Our work together on advisory committees, Great Lake Fishery Commission committees, and through the multitude of local fishing groups that I have met with easily impressed upon

These were always the best opportunity for me to get to know new Captains and hear about their on-the-water experiences firsthand. There was never a time there wasn't an issue to pursue somewhere!

I have deeply valued my relationship and experiences with the MCBA over the course of my career. There is not another organization that I have worked with as much as MCBA. As I head into retirement, I am sure that my path will cross some of yours in the future. I am a Michigander, and I am not going anywhere, it's time for me to enjoy the fruits of what the Department works so hard for, protecting and improving our world class resources. From the Helm . . .



What a strange winter. Warm and then cold; cold and then warm. Very little ice on the


inland lakes in Northwest

Michigan. Big Glen and Crystal Lake didn't freeze over. What's even stranger is little Glen Lake never froze over solid. There are still open spots out there. As I write this, the wind ripped the ice open on all of little Glen on February 22nd. That makes ice fishing tough. Hopefully with the warm winter, we will get a large year class of alewives in Lake Michigan.

In spite the vagaries of the weather, the important work of the Association continues to need to be done, and for sure, the elephant in the room remains the Tribal Consent Decree. The Coalition to Protect Michigan Resources filed its objections to the Decree on January 20th. I reviewed the objections and approved filing them on behalf of the Association.

It wasn't much of a holiday season with respect to the tribal issues. The core group spent hundreds of hours preparing the 164 page document, including maps, which we presented to the Court to fully explain our objections to the proposed new Consent Decree. It's a very interesting read. Please take the time you need to at the least, skim through the document to educate yourself on the proposal and our objections. The documents are on both the MCBA and Coalition websites. https:// (protectmiresources.com)

The MDNR created what we believe is a very poor and greatly misleading response to our objections. It was titled DNR FAQ's about the Tribal Decree. This press release is full of half-truths and



response shows that what we said about millions of feet of gill net being added to the tribal ceded water in places that didn't have gill nets before is absolutely true.

I personally thought everybody understood how feet of gill net is calculated, however it seems that some do not, so for those who are not familiar with how its measured, here is an explanation: Take for instance; according to the proposed CD, in Grand Traverse Bay, 4500 ft. of gill net can be fished in East and West Bay. That equals 9000 ft. per day. If that 9000 ft. is fished for 50 days during the year, that equals 450,000 ft. of gill net fishing for that year.

In Big Bay DeNoc the new Consent decree would allow up to 24,000 ft. of gill net to be fished per day. If that proposed allowed amount of gill net were to be fished for 50 days during the year, it would equal 1.2 MILLION ft. of gill net fishing per year just in Big Bay alone.

In Lake Trout zone MM-6; the area that includes Ludington, Manistee and the Pentwater, the new Consent Decree would permit two fishing tugs fishing to fish up to 6000 ft. of gill net each per day. If that 12,000 ft. of gill net is fished an average of 50 days per year, it would amount to an additional 600,000 ft. of gill net fished per year. If that effort would be concentrated in the traditional sportfishing areas, you can imagine the

impact. Finally, some parts of northern Lake Michigan, Lake Superior and northern Lake Huron are open to an UNLIMITED amount of gill net fishing per year. I hope that this clears up what we mean by millions of feet of added gill net fishing.

Outline: Treaty Area

Now, try to think of the "hook and line" fishers and those in the Charter fishing Industry, having to compete against the gill net fishery. This is why we have invested our volunteered time and the Associations funds to support the Coalition and our legal team.

should The Court receiving be documents from the seven parties responding to the Coalition's objections by March 6th. Once our legal team receives these documents, the work The Coalition has to starts again. prepare its response to the Tribes, State and Feds for hearings on May 24th and May 25th in the Federal Court in Kalamazoo. These hearings are public, and anyone can attend.

I suspect after May hearings, the judge may render his rulings and order how the Decree will be written and finalized.

There is a lot going on. The coalition response will be very time consuming and we continue to need financial help. Please consider making a donation to the MCBA Decree fund in the members area of the MCBA website, or to the "Donate Today" link on the Coalition to Protect Michigan Resources website.

The coalition negotiators need the support of all of our members. Please support them, and maybe also, wish us some luck. Our future fishery is at stake for the next 24 years. When we

started this four years ago, I never thought we would be where we may be headed today.

As I prepared to write this I learned that the Michigan DNR has selected a replacement for Fisheries Chief, Jim Dexter, who is retiring at the end of April after a 35 yearlong successful career, in

the MDNR. Jim has been the Chief of fisheries for the past ten years. We have always respected the work of Chief Dexter and he has always been a friend of the Association. We wish for him the best possible retirement. The newly appointed Chief will have large shoes to fill. Having said that we want to

welcome Randy Claramunt to his new assignment as Fisheries Division Chief. Randy is an MSU grad who joined the MDNR as marine biologist in 2002. He is currently serving as the Lake Huron Basin Coordinator. Randy is well-known to the Association. We are happy for Randy and look forward to a long and productive relationship with new Chief Randy Claramunt.

In addition to the May hearings in Kalamazoo, I will be attending the Lake Michigan Citizen's Advisory Committee meeting April 11th at Jays Sporting Goods in Clare at 10:00 a.m. Like the May hearings in Kalamazoo, the LMCAC meetings are open to the public.

Here's wishing everyone a warm spring with light winds and a strong start to the 2023 charter boat fishing season.

address emerging contaminates like PFAS Michigan drinking This in water. investment, allocated to states and will be made available territories, to communities as grants through the EPAs emerging contaminants in small or disadvantaged communities grant program and will promote access to safe and clean water in small, rural, and disadvantaged communities while supporting local economies.

Per Michigan's U.S. Senator, "People in communities Michigan across experienced the fear and frustration of finding out that contaminants like PFAS now threaten their home, community, and health of their families. This funding is critical for the clean-up of the contaminants. It will help communities who don't have the resources to address the problem on their own, clean up the contaminants so that people will have safe drinking water that we all take for granted".

EPA is also releasing the Emerging Containments in Small or Disadvantaged Implementation Communities Grant document. The document provides states and communities with the information necessary to use this funding to address water infrastructure and reduce emerging containments in drinking water implementing solutions such as installing water treatment systems.

Richmond elementary school's Green Club gets DNR grant to raise King Salmon. The grant covers the special training salmon required to have the in the classroom, the special permit required, the eggs, and the necessary fish food. Other necessary equipment is a 75 gallon fish tank, a water chiller, filter system, back-up air stones, chemicals for the tank, cleaning tools, and chemicals for tank testing. The initial cost of equipment was \$2,100

with the water chiller being particularly costly. The school has been raising funds through the PTO, Shepherd Auto Sales, Christine Shepherd and Linda Corby. A club fundraiser that took place before Christmas raised \$1000. There is a spring fundraiser of flower bulb sales is being planned.

This program is teaching the children the cycle, the importance salmon life keeping the water clean, and opportunity of giving back when the salmon are released into the Great Lakes. The students received 125 Chinook salmon eggs Michigan hatchery а November. Students are responsible for assisting with cleaning the tank, and feeding the fish. The Green Club anticipates that the salmon will be released on April 29 at Lake St. Clair Metro park in Harrison Township.

Greetings from the Keweenaw

The Baraga Village Police Department released more information on an ice rescue that took place on February 8, 2023.

The Baraga Village Police Department, Keweenaw Bay Tribal Police, and the Michigan State Police received a call about a man that had fallen through the ice and had been in the water for about five minutes. The man was near Sand Point, south of the Baraga Lighthouse.

Chief Smith from the Baraga Village Police Department, Keweenaw Bay Tribal

Officers Durwyn Chaudier, Mark Smith, and Captain Dale Goodreau arrived and saw the man submerged in the ice 300 yards north of the lighthouse.

Michigan State Police Trooper Derek Larson radioed that he could see the man from the Ojibwa Campground. Larson attempted to walk towards the man on the ice, but Larson fell through the ice just off shore.

At this time, Keweenaw Bay Tribal Commercial Fisherman James Denomie was loading his boat onto a boat trailer. Chief Smith told Denomie that an ice fisherman fell through the ice and has been in the water for 10 minutes.

Chief Smith asked Denomie if he could attempt to rescue the man. Denomie said they could try to bust through the ice with the boat.

All those responding got into Denomie's boat and when they approached the man, they realized that there were two men in the water. They were able to get both men into the boat.

Both men were in the water for approximately 35 minutes. One of the men was disorientated and not doing well.

The two men in the water were 67-year-old Michael Markham and 76-year-old James Hoke. Both were taken to Baraga County Memorial Hospital for treatment. Assisting at the scene were Bay Ambulance and Baraga Fire Department.

I searched the Michigan DNR Fish Stocking Database for plants into Lake Superior for 2022 as I did last year. Chippewa, Luce, Marquette, and Ontonagon Counties did not get any fish.

This year, ONLY 4 Counties that border Lake Superior received a total of 85,692 fish. Alger 27,500 Splake, Baraga 22,000 Splake, Gogebic 15,000 Rainbow and Keweenaw 21192 Splake.

Again this year, onlookers of the stocking event saw them being preyed upon by Gulls and Cormorants.

I then searched the Wisconsin Database for Lake Superior for the 4 counties that border it.

There were 10 plants of which 63,963 were Splake, 82,521 Lake Trout, 119,769 Walleye and 172,740 Seeforellen Brown Trout for a total of 329,993 fish. That is 385% more fish than the embarrassing Michigan effort and it has been similar for plants for at least the last 10 years.

As we rang in the New Year, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources enacted a

new set of regulations on the Saginaw River that took effect on Jan. 1, 2023. The fishing season for walleye will now be open year-round on the lower Saginaw River in Bay and Saginaw counties from the mouth of the river, upstream to West Center Street's Douglas G. Schenk bridge.

This area used to closed for walleye fishing March 16th and re-open on the last Saturday in April. No doubt this will bring welcome angling opportunities for those of us that enjoy fishing the Saginaw River. It is important to note the size and daily possession limits have not changed.

Can I have just one volunteer? I am still looking for port Captains. Please get in contact with me if you are interested. Among other duties, port Captains play an important role by communicating member concerns to the board, and allow the board to quickly communicate information back to our members.

I will be supporting the MDNR again this spring with the walleye tagging program on Saginaw Bay. We will be tagging walleye though out the month of May. If anyone is interested in participating, please get in contact with me I can put you in touch with the program manager. This is a great way to give back and support a fishery we depend on. It also lets the DNR know how much we as charter captains care about the sustainability of our Lake Huron fishery.

No doubt all of us will soon be moving our equipment out of storage. It's time of year again to give priority to checking your safety equipment. One topic I will always bring up because of its importance is your last line of defense – the fire extinguisher. As I mentioned in last year's spring edition of the Cannonball, there was a major recall by Kidde a few years back. Use the link

Ludington is scheduled to receive 100,000 Chinook Salmon fingerlings this spring.

Volunteers from the Ludington Charter Boat Association and Great Lakes; Salmon Initiative have been busy reworking the association's net pens and current deflector so they will be in good shape when the fish arrive. The pens are getting redone with hardware cloth replacing the old netting. The new material will be more durable than netting and will make it easier to release the fish when they smolt. The old current deflector is very heavy and hard to install. A new one is being made from aluminum and should be a lot easier to handle.

The Sea Grant workshop scheduled to be held February 18 in Ludington was changed to a virtual format. I virtually attended the program and found it to be informative and well run. Two of the presentations, Mass Marking Great Lakes Fish by Chuck Bronte

there has never been a greater threat to the Michigan charter boat industry than there is today with the publication of the newly proposed Consent Decree. If the decree adopted as proposed, the expanded greatly gill net fishing that would be allowed

would have the potential to eliminate much of the sport fish stocks in the Grand Traverse bays and in Lakes Michigan and Huron. Further, the thousands of feet of poorly mark nets will endanger our boats and our gear. The state DNR negotiators allow refused to the sport fishing representatives to be a part of the negotiations. It appears that the new decree was prepared primarily by only one of the states' many expert great lakes biologists. Respected retired MDNR biologists who do not have to worry about losing their jobs object to its gill net provisions strongly, but ultimately they

have no say. There will be court hearings in May. There is still time to fix the decree. Become informed. Ask questions, Speak up. The need is great.

The coalition of sport fishing organizations have published their strong objections to the Consent Decree provisions on their website:

(https://protectmiresources.com). I urge all members to go to that site. Read the proposed decree, study the issues and the coalitions objections and responses. Then make your feelings known in letters, emails and phone calls to those who have the ability to correct the flaws.

I'm retired now, but I still care, and I keep informed by being a retired member of the association. If you are thinking of retiring, consider becoming retired member. It's easy to do and not expensive. It keeps me informed about the current issues and helps me stay in touch with my friends and former colleagues in the MCBA. The retired member category is the way I Keep this in mind for your own future. When it warms up a little, look for me around the docks. Hope to see you there.

Lake Michigan 2023 Tri-state Stocking Numbers

The Michigan DNR, after decades of fish stocking decreases to balance the alewife and Chinook salmon populations is now



seeing good indicators that a modest stocking increase is warranted in Lake Michigan. Starting in 2023 the Michigan DNR 2023 stocking plans for Lake Michigan are 1,000,000 Chinook salmon, 300,000 Brown trout, 650,000 yearling Steelhead and 1,580,000 Coho salmon.

The Indiana DNR will increase Chinook salmon stocked in Lake Michigan by 50,000 starting in spring 2023, per Lake Michigan Committee agreement. The change will increase the annual production target for Chinook from 225,000 to 275,000. Baitfish populations have rebounded from an all-time low in the mid-2010s after lake-wide stocking reductions made by all state agencies during the past decade.

The Wisconsin DNR announced an increase to Lake Michigan chinook stocking goal for 2023. The DNR Lake Michigan stocking goals are 1.3 million chinook salmon, up from 1.2 million in 2020-22, as well as 500,000 coho salmon, 460,000

steelhead, 450,000 brown trout and 50,000 brook trout, the same levels as in the previous plan.

Bass Fishing World Cup

The world cup of bass fishing swims into Bay City this summer, two tournaments expected to generate two million each to the area.

The waters near Bay City are developing a reputation for quality among fishermen. Two different fishing tournaments are catching the eves of world-class bass anglers, luring them to the Saginaw River, Saginaw Bay, and Lake Huron and in July August. Each tournament is expected to generate around \$2 million for local businesses. While the fishermen are in town, the community is planning events to keep spectators entertained. The National Professional Fishing League brings its bass fishing tournament to this area on July 16-22. Then, from Aug. 1-6, Major League Fishing invites the top 80 anglers in the world to participate in a tournament in Bay County. 🌦
